Please continue to pray for us as we are in this season of transition. Pray that we can establish a strong family identity even in the midst of many physical moves, and that the Lord would be preparing relationships for each member of our family in Bolivia.

We've spent a lot of time (what seems like way too much time) sorting through every one of our earthly possessions. We have taken several carloads to the donation center, disposed of things not worth keeping, and sold items that are worth the time and effort. Our goal is to end up with only those things that are important enough to fit in those two suitcases, or valuable enough to store. It has been an exhausting process, and has led me to re-evaluate my relationship with *stuff*.

In the United States, we seem to be sold on the idea that *more stuff* = *more happiness*. This may be changing (I'm thinking of Marie Kondo), but we are undoubtedly a consumer-oriented society. This is no new revelation, but since we've begun this process of downsizing (again), I've become hyper-aware of it. that I don't need. In fact, I don't even have to leave my house; Amazon will send me almost anything I desire within two days!

Yes, that new gadget might make some aspect of my life marginally more convenient, but there is a cost beyond the purchase price. Every thing demands a place in my home and just a little bit of my attention. A thousand small things can add up to a large burden and become a distraction from what's really important.

Jesus said that we cannot love God and money (possessions). I've never thought of myself as loving possessions, but I sure have a lot—and find it surprisingly difficult to part with many of them! Jesus' desire is to free us from the burdens that the world would place on us. First and foremost, he frees us from the bondage of sin.
